GERMANY MAKES PROGRESS IN REVIVING TRADE. WASHINGTON, March 18.—Germany is making good progress in a drive to revive her pre-war trade in low priced articles with South America, according to a report to the department of commerce today from Commercial Attache McQueen at Santiago, Chile.

Germany's appeal, Mr. McQueen said, is made for the most part on a price basis though not as low as before the war. However, he added, American goods are priced so high because of exchange rates that German goods are at least 10 per cent below them.

According to reports from the east coast, he continued, the Germans are not working as hard in Chile as they are in Argentina and Brazil. The opinion prevails also, he said, that German competition is not a great factor in the present checking of American trade with Chile.

In this connection Mr. McQueen declared business in Chile has just passed through a crisis and is as yet hardly recuperated and the market does not need goods at present. British, French and Belgian goods, he added, are much favored by the present premium on dollars as are the Germans.

Mr. Daniels and family have made lots of friends here who will dislike to see them leave but all rejoice in his promotion.

RIOTOUS SCENES MARK TOKIO DEMONSTRATION. TOKIO, March 17.—Riotous scenes were enacted at a meeting of the Kensei Kai, or opposition party, which had gathered here today to discuss a sensational open letter written by Secretary Hirooka, of the Seiyun Kai party, charging Viscount Kato, president of the Kensei Kai, with accepting a bribe. The meeting was attended by twenty persons and when Representative Shimizu attempted to speak a dozen men rushed forward and demolished the platform. This increased the excitement and there were many fights in the crowd, and the police were forced to interfere, making many arrests.

After the meeting had broken up, a crowd, headed by two automobiles, marched toward the diet building, which was surrounded by two cordons of police, with hundreds of reserves in nearby streets and parks. The correspondent of The Associated Press sought to traverse this district, but was politely requested to take another street.

Arriving at the diet building the crowd was harangued by leaders, who spoke from automobiles. The throng was urged to break through the police cordons and roaring cheers burst from the crowd, which surged forward, but police reserves were hurried up, and the manufacturers were forced to retreat. Their leaders were arrested, while newspaper photographers perched on monuments and in trees, took pictures of the scene.

In the meantime there was greatest excitement under the diet. The peers unanimously adopted a resolution proposed by Ren Nakashima, declaring the attitude of the emperor disintegrating the minds of the people in a state of unrest, and the nation's prestige abroad impaired and general conditions deplorable. The resolution asserted it was desirable to speedily rectify prevailing evils.

Amidst turbulent scenes, the house of representatives discussed a resolution sponsored by the Kensei Kai party, censuring the government for the scandal regarding the south Manchurian railway.

It was the prevailing opinion here today that the ministry is confronted with a serious crisis.

FACES 50 POLICE BEFORE BEING SHOT TO DEATH. CHICAGO, March 18.—Facing more than 50 policemen, a bandit with a pistol in each hand, was shot to death today after he had kept up a steady fight with them until his ammunition was exhausted.

Several policemen were wounded and one, Detective Mix, is in a critical condition.

Mix, noticing the bandit loitering at a street corner early today, started to question him. The man opened fire and ran. Reinforcements came to Mix's rescue and the bandit finally was cornered.
