—Misses Kato Moore Rankin and Laura Hendrix, of the city school faculty, will spend the Easter holidays in Charlotte and Greensboro, respectively.

—The executive committee of the Women's Club requests that those who have trash and litter around their premises, gather it up and place it in the city wagon or will group and collect it.

—City public works is interesting meeting held at the city street this morning. Woodford is surprised to see a traffic light lighted in the city today. That is at that street and municipal affairs.

—Mrs. Martha Zehms, of Columbia street, who has been in Charlotte for the past four weeks, will arrive in Gastonia tonight to be the guest of Mrs. N. J. Dickens for a day or two.

—A meeting of the executive committee of the State Firemen's Association will be held in this city at 10 o'clock Monday, March 28. At this meeting arrangements will be completed for the holding of the State Firemen's Convention in this city, probably in June.

Galloway, of Greer, a returned missionary, will deliver addresses on foreign missions. Rev. R. C. King, of Gastonia, is expected to deliver an address. The presbyterial is composed of the two counties of Gaston, Cherokee, Lenoir, Pick and Rutherford. A large crowd is expected to attend.

—Yorkville Enterprise: Miss Margaret Thompson, nee of the Beth Shabbat section of York county, lost her pocket-book and about \$1,200 in currency in an unknown manner last Thursday. Mrs. Thompson had brought the money to Bank Hall for deposit in a local bank. She visited several stores en route to the bank and on her arrival there found that the money was gone.
