LOYD ROSS ELECTED COUNTY ENGINEER FOR MECKLENBURG COUNTY

Charlotte Observer. Line-up of the personnel of the Mecklenburg county highway commission was tentatively made at an informal meeting of the commission yesterday afternoon in the office of Thomas Griffin, chairman, with the selection of Lloyd M. Ross as county highway engineer. G. D. Bradshaw as secretary and bookkeeper and James L. DeLaney as attorney. The action yesterday was unofficial, as the new commission, composed of Chairman Griffin, Arthur J. Draper and J. S. Withers, does not begin to function as a commission until April 4, when the entire road work of the county will be placed in the hands of these three men, in accordance with the act passed at the recent session of the general assembly. The official action is expected to take place at the first meeting of the commission on the first Monday in April, when the three men selected to fill the three places will be elected officially. Mr. Ross is considered an able road engineer and has had considerable experience and training for such a position. He is the son of J. H. Ross, of this city, and a graduate of the University of North Carolina. For some time he has been associated with the street commission in Charlotte and was engineer in the construction of Dowd road, recognized as one of the best highways in the county. During the past few years Mr. Ross has been employed as engineer in various building roads in Gaston county. The commission expresses the belief that he will be an able and efficient county engineer and that the county is fortunate in securing a young man of his training and experience.

HELPED MOTHER TO CLUB STEPFATHER TO CLUB STEPFATHER

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., March 26. Casper Dittin, 14 years old, confessed today that he helped his mother club to death his stepfather, Joseph Scullins, last night. Then, according to the confession, he and his brother James, nine years old, placed the body in a bag and carried it to the railroad yards where they left it. The body was found early today by a switching crew. He was awakened during the night, Casper declared, by a quarrel between his mother and stepfather. "I struck him with an axe and a shovel, and my mother hit him with a stick." The police quote him as saying: "Then my brother and I carried the body away in the bag." Mrs. Scullins and the two boys were taken into custody shortly after the body was found.

STATE COLLEGE WINS INTERCOLLEGIATE MATCH

RALEIGH, N. C., March 24.—The State College rifle team, with a score of 1934 out of a possible 2,000, won the intercollegiate rifle match for R. O. T. C. units in the Fourth Corps Area, according to information received yesterday from Corps headquarters at Fort MePherson, Ga., by Col. Daniel D. Gregory, commanding officer at the college. The first four teams ranked as follows: North Carolina State, 1,934; Alabama Polytechnic Institute, 1,914; University of Alabama, 1,909; Georgia Tech, 1,893. Twenty-three colleges in the states of North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Georgia, Alabama, Florida, Arkansas, Louisiana and Mississippi competed, the match being shot on the home range of each institution and certified by the commanding officer. The four leaders earned the right to enter teams in the Ninth Corps Area match which will be fired between the 10th and 20th of April. State College has accepted the challenge and will compete with the leading colleges and universities of the West. The Tech team with the individual scores in the recent competition, was as follows: W. N. Hinks, 200; D. D. Overton, 196; R. M. Strickland, 194; W. W. Johnston, 194; C. M. White, 191; W. H. Browne, 193; H. O. Kennette, 188; W. L. Steele, 191; P. K. Ewell, 191; R. E. Brown, 193. Total, 1,934.

WAS POSTCARD SUFFICIENT NOTICE TO BERGDOLL?

KANSAS CITY, Mo., March 26.—Whether mailing of a postcard constituted sufficient notification of a summons to the jurors under the selective draft act is the principal point involved for decision in habeas corpus proceedings on call in federal court at Kansas City, Kan., today, to bring about the release from prison of Erwin Bergdoll, of Philadelphia. Bergdoll, brother of Grover Cleveland Bergdoll, draft evader now in Germany, is serving a five year sentence in the federal penitentiary at Fort Leavenworth, Kas., following his conviction by court martial on charges of evading the draft. It is understood the decision will determine whether several thousand "shirkers" will be brought to trial. Bergdoll contends that he never received notice to report for military service. The government seeks to introduce evidence proving that a postcard notice was mailed to Bergdoll, and that proof of mailing is all that is required. Willing Messngr.
