### WOULD DIVIDE GRAIN GROWING SECTION

CHICAGO, April 7.—Division of the grain growing sections of the country in twenty nine districts, grouped around grain market centers, each with a director as representative on the farmers' national cooperative marketing organization, was submitted today by the committee of 17 to the farmers' delegates assembling to form the cooperative system.

When the re-districting has been approved, delegates from each section will convene, it was said, and choose their directors, who will form the controlling body in the national company.

Debate on the compulsory pooling feature of the cooperative marketing and other disputed points kept the delegates busy until late last night, all attempts to amend the optional pooling recommendation of the committee of 17 being voted down.

### ANASTASIA MAY COME TO AMERICA

ATHENS, April 8.—Princess Anastasia, who is convalescing from her recent illness, may go to America soon, and will take a special steamer to New York, if it can be obtained.

It was originally intended that she would journey to England for the purpose of undergoing a second operation, but in view of the fact that Great Britain has not recognized King Constantine, it was feared that the Princess' husband, Prince Christopher, might possibly not be altogether welcome. Princess Anastasia has refused to consider making the trip alone and is said to be unwilling to leave her husband. Her recovery is being retarded by attacks of nausea.

### GOSHEN GROVE BOYS AND GIRLS CLUBS STAGE AN INTERESTING PROGRAM

The Goshen Grove boys' and girls' agricultural club rendered an excellent program Thursday night at their regular monthly meeting and decided to have a club picnic at Lakewood Park on April 26th. All features of club work were functioning in good style Thursday night as the program was in charge of the officers of the club, giving them experience in conducting meetings and parliamentary practices. Those on the program were given experience in public speaking.

Miss Margaret Warren was present and told the club an interesting story, after which plays and games were indulged in, led by the county agents, assisted by Misses Johnnie Dulin and Margaret Warren. Such a large number being present, it was necessary to divide the crowd into two groups, one of which was in charge of the county agent, the other the assistant county agent. After the recreational period delicious refreshments, consisting of ice cream and cake were served.

In addition to the course of instruction which, if followed up for four years, will be equal to four years training in an agricultural high school, the members of the boys' and girls' agricultural clubs are being given the same advantages in social and recreational development that the Community Service is trying to give to the town boys and girls in Gastonia and elsewhere.

No better spirit is to be found in any community than that shown, not only by the boys and girls of Goshen Grove community, but also by the parents who lend their encouragement by backing the boys and girls with their projects and coming out to their meetings to observe their programs.

Much credit is due Miss Margaret Rowlett, teacher and leader of this club, for her most excellent work in organizing and conducting the work in this community.

### WOMEN TO PROBE EVERY ANGLE OF POLITICS AND POLITICAL MACHINES

CLEVELAND, O., April 8.—Every angle of the present day activity in American politics by political bosses and political machines will come up for action before the second annual convention of the National League of Women Voters, which opens here Monday. This became apparent when the executive board, which is rounding out the final details of the convention schedule, announced the program for the study of election methods.

The board had before it today a report on policy submitted recently by Miss Katherine Ludington, of Hartford, Conn. In this report the National League is offered a choice between two policies.

One is to develop a well informed woman electorate in America, to reach all women, teach them how to vote and whom to vote for.

The other is to put through as rapidly as possible a program of legislation, considered beneficial to the women of the nation at large.

If amendments to the National League by-laws prepared by the board yesterday are adopted by the convention, national officers will be elected by the delegates instead of being the choicers of elected regional directors.

State women's voters league chairmen began arriving today for a conference Sunday between the national board and the state chairmen. Meetings of the regional directors and chairman of standing committees also were held today.

### TO CONSIDER MANDATE.

LONDON, April 8.—Consideration of the British mandate over Mesopotamia will be begun at the next meeting of the council of the league of nations, which will be held in June, Premier Lloyd George has written to Sir J. D. Ross, member of the house of commons, who inquired regarding the subject.

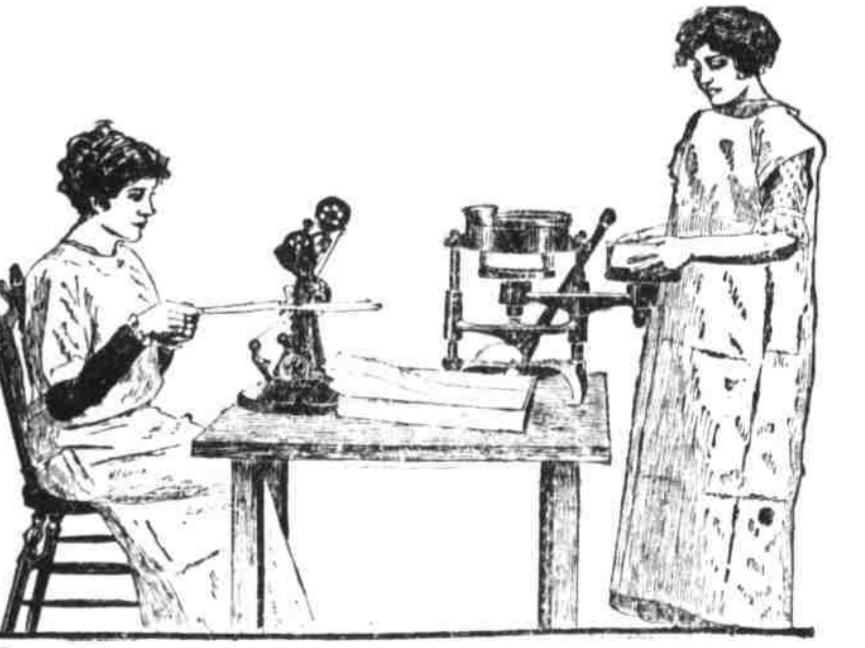
