## STATE T. P. A. MEETS IN GREENSBORO MAY 13 AND 14

The Annual Convention of the North Carolina Division of the T. P. A. will be held at Greensboro, on May 13 and 14th, with Post A, as host.

Post A has prepared a very interesting combination of business and pleasure hours, and from early Friday morning until midnight Saturday, there will be something doing.

The North Carolina Division now numbers 1,100 members and is eighth in rank among the 15 Divisions of the national organization. Winston-Salem leads with 450 members, followed by four guards with 25.

There are 225 regular delegates selected from the 27 Posts that make up the Division, and Winston-Salem has over 500 Greenshans over 600. High Point over 180, and other Posts will have visitors, it is expected that 1,000 T. P. A.'s will be found in the State City on above dates.

National T. P. A. now has over 90,000 members, and is engaged in much useful work for the public's benefit. For courtesy to the average man's opinion, accident insurance is a "side issue" with T. P. A. Hotels, Rail Roads, Legislation, Employment, all come ahead of the insurance feature.

In this State, the Hotel Sanitation laws and the Alcoholic Vets' law are especially due to work of T. P. A. At present, the weight of the National organization is being thrown on the effort because a resumption of the Mileage Book.

## WOULD NOT TOLERATE SUCH ANGLLO-JAP TREATY.

LONDON, May 6.—British overseas dominions would not tolerate an Anglo-Japanese treaty having as its object opposition to the United States, declared the Weekly Spectator today. The newspaper devoted considerable space to a discussion of Anglo-American relations and Japan, and cited facts to show that an alliance between England and Japan was never meant, and never could be used against America. "Yet we have until now left the most important argument on our side unstarted," the newspaper continued. "Even the most wildly imperialistic aggressive of Britons do not contemplate with pleasure the blowing of the British empire into smithereens in a single instant. We all know perfectly well this will be the result if we went to war against America, not to support some rights of our own, but in order to help the Japanese." The moment such a war was declared, the bonds that united us with our dominions would be severed.

## FOREIGN BORN RENEW PLEDGES OF LOYALTY

WASHINGTON, May 6.—A renewed pledge of loyalty and patriotic service on the part of foreign born citizens was brought to President Harding today by a delegation representing 21 of the racial conference committees of the Inter Racial Council of New York. The purpose of the visit was said to be to promote mutual understanding between the foreign born and other citizens of the country and not to discuss details of present or proposed immigration legislation.
