RED MEN TO INSTALL NEW GREAT SACHEM SATURDAY NIGHT

John G. Carpenter, of Gastonia, to Be Inducted Into Office of Great Sachem With Big Ceremony in Charlotte.

Mr. John G. Carpenter, of Gastonia, will be installed as Great Sachem of the Improved Order of Red Men in Charlotte on Saturday night, May 21, at 8 o'clock. The installation will be held in the council chamber of the Red Men of Catawba Tribe. Just prior to the installation ceremonies the different tribes of the Red Men of Mecklenburg, Gaston, Cleveland and other counties adjacent will have a torchlight parade in honor of the installation of the head of the organization of the state.

The Red Men of this section of North Carolina are proud of the fact that one of its members from this section has been so signally honored and Catawba, Pocomoke and Aztec Tribes of Charlotte are preparing for a great celebration on Saturday night. Every Red Man is invited and urged to be present and they are urged to come early so as to participate in the parade. The installation will be a public affair and the public is also invited to join with the Red Men on this occasion. Captain J. R. Amerson has been commissioned by the Great Council of North Carolina to preside and have charge of the installation ceremonies.

NINE BALLOONS TO BE ENTERED IN BIG RACE. NEW YORK, May 18.—Nine balloons, to be piloted by some of the country's foremost aviators, have been entered in the national balloon race, to be started at Birmingham, Ala., Saturday, the Aero Club of America announced today.

Lieut. Col. Frank P. Lahn, U. S. A., winner of the first Gordon Bennett balloon race, will pilot the army balloon. His aide will be Major Oscar Westover, chief of the balloon and air ship division of the air service.

H. E. Honeywell, Bernard von Hoffman, captain John Berry, and J. S. McKelhen, all representing St. Louis, have entered balloons. The Akron chamber of commerce has entered the "City of Akron," to be piloted by Wade T. Van Tramm.

The municipality of Birmingham has entered the "City of Birmingham" with Roy F. Donaldson as pilot, and W. E. Robinson, of the University of Illinois, as able.

Ralph Egan, who won the Gordon Bennett race in 1915, is another entrant. The Navy will be represented by Lieut. Commander T. J. Roth.

Allan R. Hawley will represent the Aero Club of America as referee in the race, which will be the closing feature of Birmingham's three-day anniversary celebration.

MOTOR LOAD OF SOLDIERS IS AMBUSHED. DUBLIN, May 18.—A motor load of soldiers was ambushed this morning near Luchaire, one soldier being killed and one wounded. The soldiers returned the fire, but the results are not known.

While soldiers were playing a football match in London, county Cork, yesterday, armed civilians began firing with a machine gun. Several of the spectators were wounded. A military patrol engaged the attacking force and covered the retreat of the football players to the barracks, where a fight that lasted half an hour ensued.
