Belmont Relative of Jake Willard, of Indian Creek, Figures in Transaction. (Gastonia County News)

Mr. J. E. Austin, of Long Shoals, who some days ago reported to the police the theft of \$1,000 from his home, was made to feel good last Saturday when every cent of the money was returned to him.

Sheriff Abernathy put in almost two days on the case. Will Smith and Jake Willard, of Indian Creek, and previously been arrested and passed in jail for a suspect. Ben Willard, of Charlotte, brother of Jake Willard, was the third man involved. Smith and the Ben Willard were examined by Exp. Dr. Smith and gave bond to Lincolnville County \$200 for Will Smith and J. E. Willard, and \$100 for Ben Willard, and were released until July court.

### NEBRASKA WOMEN ARE ENJOYING SPECIAL PRIVILEGES

Lincoln, Neb., May 20. Enjoying all the statutory rights of suffrage with men, women of Nebraska have the advantage of half a dozen privileges and immunities granted to their sex, which the men are denied.

For instance, she cannot be allowed to work more than 52 hours a week and never between 10 p. m. and 6 a. m.

If she is a dependent mother, she gets a state pension, but no such provision is made for dependent fathers.

Under the laws of Nebraska, nothing can keep her from a third of her husband's salary after his death. She also has a widow's "separate" fund drawn from the common law, which gives her the temporary use of all her husband's personal property and \$200 in money during the period of mourning. The contract is not for as long.

She can charge bills for necessities to her husband, and she has the full right to support.

Under the statutes of Nebraska, she is exempt from poll tax and from jury duty.
