Most Modern and Up-to-Date Moonshine Plant Ever Captured in County Is Taken in Kitchen of Rex Mill Inhabitant. Introducing himself to A. N. Lindsay at the latter's front door at the Rex Mill Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock, Sheriff J. W. Carroll said, "Mr. Lindsay, I understand you have a still here. I'd like to see it."

"Yes, we have a still," replied Lindsay very nonchalantly. "Walk right in, go back to the kitchen and you will find it."

Surprised at the cordial reception tendered him, the sheriff walked back to the kitchen and sure enough there he found what he describes as the most complete little illicit liquor distilling outfit captured in Gaston county since he has been sheriff. It was all copper and was arranged for double distillation.

"We make a little liquor on it occasionally for our own use," said the owner. "I haven't any in the house and never sold any. Just like to have a little number one liquor around the house for our own medicinal and social use."

Sheriff Carroll, who was accompanied by Deputy Sheriff J. A. Bush and Police man Parrish, brought the still back and has it on exhibition in the basement of the court house.

Before Magistrate S. S. Morris this morning Lindsay was given a preliminary hearing and was held for trial in Superior Court under a \$300 bond.
