MISTRIAL ORDERED IN LANFORD CASE

(By the Associated Press.) SPARTANBURG, S. C., June 18.—In the court of sessions today Judge Thomas S. Sene ordered a mistrial in the case against T. E. Lanford, young white man charged with the murder of Glenn Foster and Guy McDowell, taxicab drivers, on March 29, last, after one of the jurors had become seriously ill and was unable to continue to serve. Judge Sene later granted Lanford bail in the sum of \$20,000, over the protest of the state's attorneys.

In Polk Superior Court last week Noah Williams, white, aged 65, was convicted of illicit distilling and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$1,000 and to serve six months on the roads.

An effort is being made to have repealed the present law requiring examination of children as a prerequisite to their enrollment in the public schools. The State board of health is opposing such an effort.
