NEAR EAST RELIEF.

Once again the distressing cries of "starving and dying children" come direct to the ears of Gastonites from the Christian land of Armenia and the waste and desolate cities of the Near East. Gaston county is asked to adopt 133 of these World War orphans at the ridiculous low cost of \$60.00 per year to clothe, feed and educate one child, who otherwise will be left in the street to die and be carried away to a general dumping ground and potter's field.

All pastors in this county are urged to lay this needy and worthy cause on the hearts of their people and prepare for Gaston's quota of 12 to 26. Mr. A. G. Myers, president of the Citizens National Bank is the joint-treasurer for Gastonia and the county. Mr. J. H. Separk has been asked to assume the presidency and Mr. W. J. Francis, of Belmont, the vice-presidency of the Gaston campaign. Reverends J. H. Hendlerite, city chairman and G. R. Gillespie, county chairman are working as a unit for city and county for the adoption of 133 of these orphans at \$60.00 each, \$7,980 or about 14¢ per capita of county population. If the pastors will earnestly and prayerfully call the attention of their people to the suffering, and urgent need of relief funds, from now until February 26 Gaston county will "go over the top" in the true Gaston spirit.

ATLANTA BANDIT IS ARRESTED IN DETROIT

(By The Associated Press.) ATLANTA, Jan. 14.—Frank R. Dupre, under indictment here charged with murder as a result of the killing of one man and the wounding of another during a jewelry store robbery December 15, was found in Detroit, Mich., yesterday, when he sought to leave a Chattanooga pawn broker send him \$400 more on the \$2,500 diamond he is alleged to have stolen during the holdup, according to word received by Atlanta police.

Detectives arrested Dupre, who later confessed, according to Detroit dispatches, shortly after he inquired at the post-office for mail addressed to "F. H. Parker."

The diamond had been presented in Chattanooga for \$300 cash, according to police, who announced they discovered it there. Detroit dispatches also said a copy of a letter received by the Atlanta Constitution two days ago purporting to come from Dupre, was found in the latter's room in Detroit. The letter predicted the "Pensacola bandit" would not be caught.

NATIONAL CONFERENCE ON AGRICULTURE MONDAY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—Plans for presenting a picture of the agricultural situation in the United States have been completed for the national conference opening Monday week. This picture, Secretary Wallace said today, will be drawn through the medium of speakers from the various sections, addressing the gathering immediately following the opening speech of President Harding. "What can we do about it?" will be taken up at the Tuesday morning session by several short addresses of a constructive nature, the Secretary declared. The European situation and its rela-

tion to the condition of American agriculture is also planned for presentation Tuesday with related suggestions, the agricultural secretary said. Morning sessions of the conference probably will be devoted to open discussions and the afternoons to meetings in which the delegates are expected to arrange for the more systematic carrying on of the work.

Problems of a general nature will be laid before the delegates at the morning conferences, Mr. Wallace said, the question of marketing probably would come up Wednesday. Production, transportation, financing, together with marketing are looked on by agricultural officials as other important matters to be considered.

The present emergency of the farmers is expected to be not considered, but later on questions of a permanent agricultural policy will have the major place on the program. Food supply for an increasing population, intelligent utilization of the land, scientific agricultural research, and conservation and renewal of forestry are some of the matters for deliberation under the permanent part of the program.

IT NEEDS NO ARGUMENT IT IS A MORAL ISSUE THAT MUST BE FACED IN GASTON COUNTY

Dr. W. S. Rankin, head of the State Health Work, declares the building of a Sanatorium to properly treat such cases as develop in the county to be a moral issue, rather than a business one. It is estimated that there are upwards of seven or eight hundred tubercular victims in Gaston county. Public health authorities can account for considerably more than 400 open, avowed cases. How many more there are undiscovered and in the incipient stages no one knows. The cost of treatment annually of these 400 or more is estimated at \$250,000. The loss to the community in earning power is easily \$250,000.

The County can take a forward step in the prevention of this annual loss by the issuance of bonds in the sum of \$150,000 for the erection of a modern Sanatorium, and levying a small tax rate for the maintenance of the institution.
