According to the letter, Covell impersonated Colonel Roosevelt, signed his name and got the money. Mrs. Burkett recently was convicted in New York city of forgery in connection with the case. Covell said he is now serving a term in a New York prison.

Covell said he had been a "Rough Rider" and had also worked for Mr. Burkett while living in Danville, Ill. He said he greatly resembled Mr. Roosevelt and often had forged the former President's name to papers. He said Mrs. Burkett had no idea she was duped.
