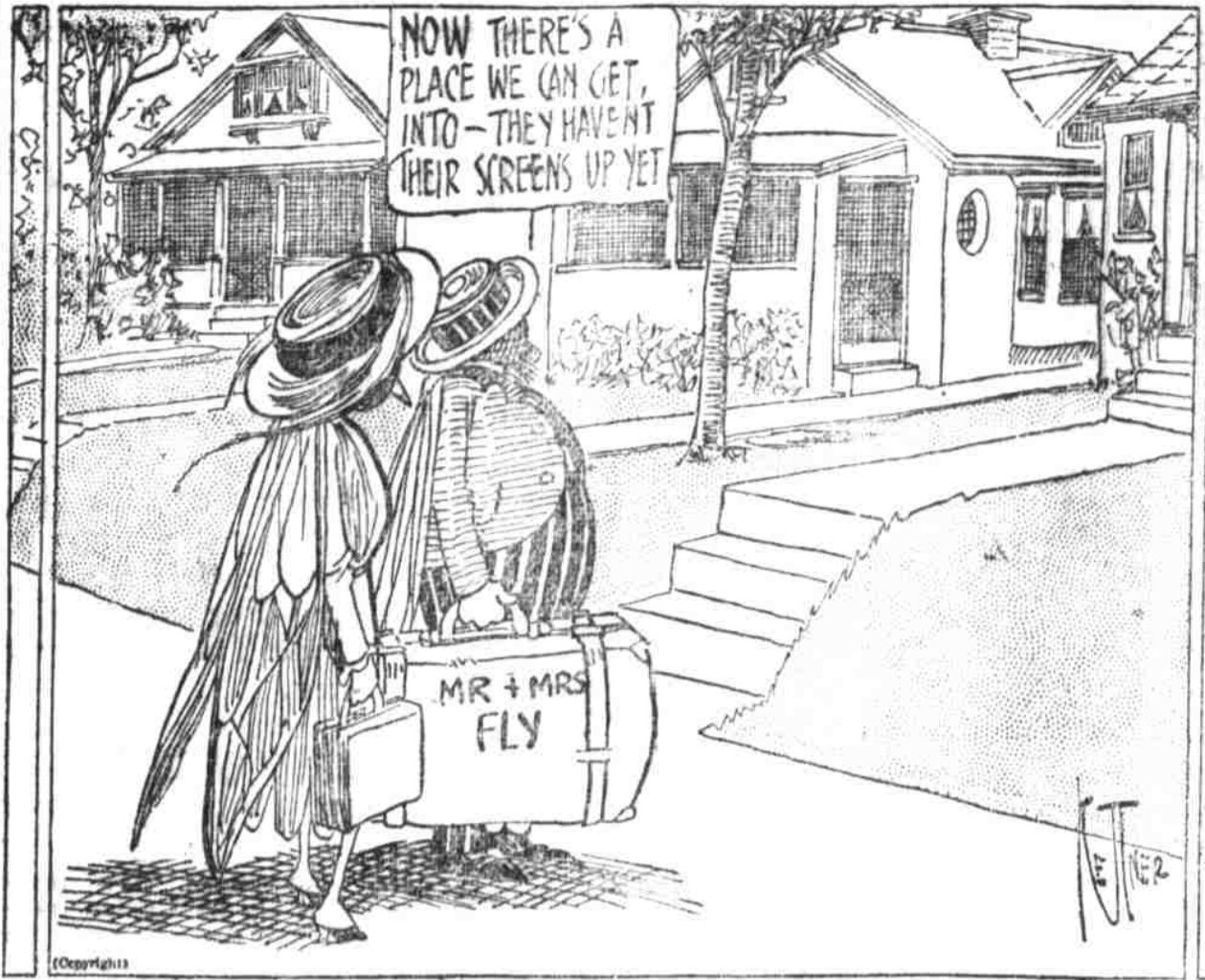

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING STREET IMPROVEMENTS.

Be it resolved and ordained by the City Council of the City of Gastonia:

That West Airline Avenue from Highland Street to Hanson Street; and East Second Avenue from Chestnut Street to Church Street; and South Chestnut Street from Fifth Avenue to Sixth Avenue; and West Fifth Avenue from Chester Street to Jackson Street; and West Sixth Avenue from York Street to Jackson Street; and West Third Avenue from York Street to South Street; and West Second Avenue from Chester Street to Clay Street, be improved, said improvements to include the grading, widening, extending, or otherwise altering wherever necessary the said streets, and the laying thereon of pavement which shall be either concrete or asphalt with concrete base, or asphalt macadam; also the construction of curbs, gutters, drains and storm sewers which shall be of the standard construction, as adopted by the City of Gastonia, and also the construction or reconstruction, including grading of cement sidewalk or sidewalks, and all work to be done under and in accordance with Chapter 26 of the Public Laws of the State of North Carolina, of 1915, and amendments thereof.

And be it further resolved and ordained that for the purpose of securing uniformity in said work that said work shall be done by the said City of Gastonia by contract or by the forces of said City of Gastonia.

And be it further resolved that all property owners along said streets, and hereby required, at their own costs, to make all sewer, water, and gas connections along said street with their property, on or before the 15th day of May, 1922, in such manner as the City Manager shall direct, and if not done by that date, the said City of Gastonia will make such connections, and the cost thereof, will be assessed against such property where the connections are made, and the same will be a lien thereon and collected as the cost of making the street improvements as herein stated.

And be it further resolved and ordained, that one-half of the total cost of such improvements as shall be made as above stated, exclusive of so much of the cost as is incurred at street intersections shall be specially assessed upon the lots and parcels of land abutting directly on said street where such improvements are made according to the extent of their respective frontages thereon by an equal rate per foot of such frontage, such assessments being a lien on said property, and that the terms of payment for such work by the said property owners, shall be in cash or in ten equal annual installments, bearing interest at the rate of five percent per annum and shall be payable and collected at the same time that taxes are collected, and each installment thereof shall become due at the same time that other taxes are due, the first installment becoming due next after the completion of said improvement.

I hereby certify that the foregoing resolution was passed and adopted by the City Council of Gastonia, on 15th day of April, 1922.

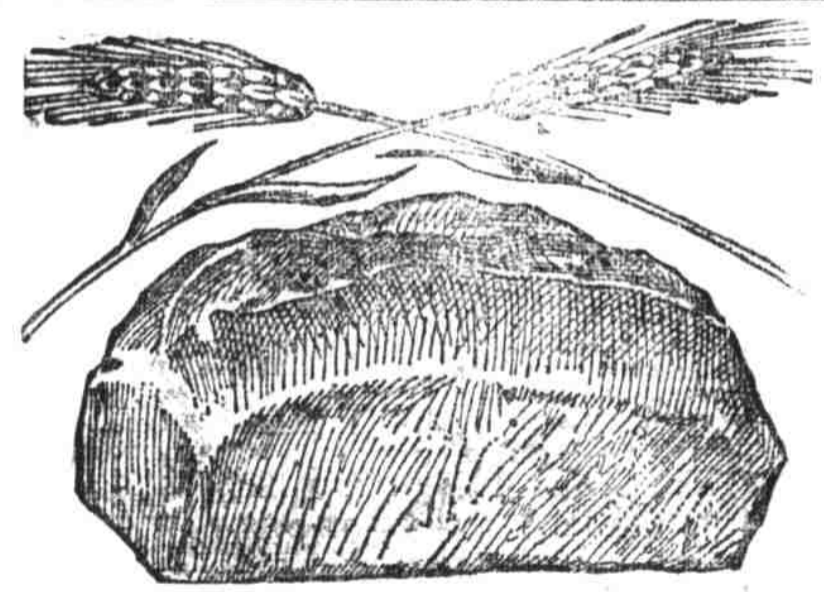
