HARD FOR GERMANY TO FIND A NEW FOREIGN MINISTER

BERLIN, June 26.—(By the Associated Press.)—Selection of a man to fill the post of foreign minister, made vacant by the assassination of Dr. Walter Rathenau, presents difficulties of some magnitude to Chancellor Wirth. This is not only because of the dearth of available men, but also for inner political reasons, as the question of the realignment of the coalition is one of the possibilities growing out of the present situation.

Parliamentary circles believe Chancellor Wirth will direct the foreign office until a man is found who can not only meet the exacting demands of the post, but who will also have the approval of the coalition parties.

The friends of Dr. Otto Ludwig Wolfeldt, ambassador to the United States, have already suggested him as an available candidate, stressing his qualifications as an economist. They also believe his previous training in responsible civil service positions and experience abroad in a quasi-diplomatic posts previous to going to Washington have given him the equipment necessary for the foreign office position, especially since the reparations problem and other economic issues have virtually become the chief features of the ministry's official routine.

The \$3,463 left from a fund raised by the old Manhattan Club of New York for the purpose of defense during the war, has been turned over to the New York American Legion to be used in building a veterans' tuberculosis camp in the Adirondack mountains.

DUTCH AFRAID EX-Kaiser MIGHT ATTEMPT FLIGHT TO RE-ENTER GERMANY

LONDON, June 26.—Apprehension exists in Holland lest former Kaiser Wilhelm attempt to slip away from Dora and re-enter Germany in the event of a royalist rising following the assassination of Foreign Minister Rathenau, according to the correspondent of The Daily Mail at The Hague.

The writer, however, quotes J. B. Kan, secretary of the Dutch Home Office, as saying that such apprehension is groundless.

"We have no evidence that the Kaiser has any such intention," he said, "and the surveillance maintained around him is so close that it would be impossible for him to get away even if he wished."

DEMPEY-WILLS BOUT MAYBE SIGNED TODAY

NEW YORK, June 26.—Articles for a contest between Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight boxing champion, and Harry Wills, negro champion, may be signed today or tomorrow.

Dempsey reached New York yesterday after a trip from his home in Los Angeles, declaring his willingness to fight "anybody, any time, anywhere." Coincident with his arrival, promoter Tex Rickard announced negotiations for the proposed match with Wills were making a definite stage.

Managers of both boxes have expressed their willingness to sign for the contest and apparently only certain details remain to be ironed out.

TWO CONVICTED FOR MURDER OF MARSHAL WILSON

LONDON, June 26.—A verdict of wilful murder against James Connolly and James O'Brien, was returned this afternoon by the coroner's jury in the inquest into the killing of Field Marshal Sir Henry Hughes Wilson, assassinated last Thursday. The accused men, who were arrested immediately after the crime, did not attend today's hearing on advice of counsel.

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
