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**LUTHERAN SYNOD ADOPTS BIG BUDGET**

KINGS MOUNTAIN, Nov. 16.—Dr. A. Steward Hartman, speaking in the interest of domestic missions of the Synod, said, "The opportunity for this phase of the church's work is with the more than sixty millions of people in this country without God or without hope." The church must be planted and strengthened at home if we expect to meet in a small measure the fruition anticipated in Christ's Command to preach the Gospel to all people.

The budget adopted at this morning session at the church's program for the coming year involves a total of \$100,000, expenditure of funds for the Synod.

Mr. Ernest Lineberger, of Dallas, Dr. W. H. Greener, Professor in the Southern Lutheran Theological Seminary, Columbia, S. C., Rev. Luther Selber, representative of Oregon Home at Salem, Ore., and Dr. L. S. G. Miller, Missionary to Japan were speakers at the morning session.

President Jacob L. Morgan having been elected a year ago and whose term of office is for five years called for no such election at this synod. The present recording Secretary, Rev. H. B. Schaeffer, Statistical Secretary, Rev. E. H. Kohn, Ph.D., and Treasurer, Hon. James D. Heilig, were unanimously elected.

Following the sermon at the night session by Rev. V. C. Eldenhour, of Albemarle, N. C., there were three young men ordained to the Gospel ministry in the persons of B. A. Barringer, Ashboro, E. K. Counts, Asheville and S. White Rhyme, Goldsboro.



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
