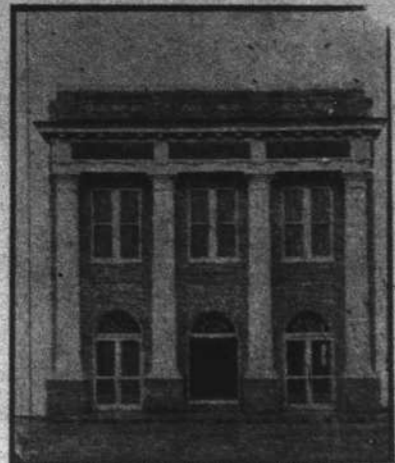

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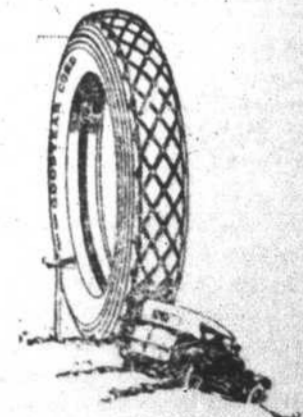

Three shots are said to have been fired in quick succession by the infuriated King, all of them taking effect in Clack's legs somewhere between the waist and the knees.

It is said that there was one other person at least, and possibly more, in the roadster with the white man who shot at King as he fled. The shot fired by this man is said to have lodged in King's leg between the knee and hip. But King was evidently not much hurt, since he continued his flight and has not been heard of. On the other hand Clack is said to have been unable to travel after absorbing the three shots fired by King, and it is reported that he was later arrested.
