Raleigh, N. C., Oct. 13.—Cooperation in selling dairy products, when properly developed and managed will aid the dairy industry of North Carolina and will increase its returns, but efficient production of milk is the most important factor in successful dairying.

"Efficient production is still within the control of the individual dairyman," says John A. Arey dairy extension specialist at State College. "This factor is not dependent on group action. If all the dairymen of the State knew exactly what it was costing them to produce milk, the danger of overproduction would be greatly reduced. There would be no surplus at any of our large milk markets if the unprofitable cows were slaughtered."
