HEALTH SURVEY BEING MADE BY STATE NURSE

Miss Cora Beam, of Raleigh, Visiting Schools.

Miss Cora Beam, of Raleigh, a state school nurse, working under the direction of the State Board of Health, has been in Caswell for several weeks, visiting the various schools in the county. She is here to make a county survey, and is examining the children to locate any physical defects that may be hindering them from doing their best work and making the advancement in their studies which they ought to make.

Miss Beam has been in Caswell twice before in clinics and is not a stranger to our people. She says she has found many physical defects among the children, which is always true of any large body of students. Miss Beam's work is endorsed by the physicians of the county, and they say she knows what she is doing. She is sent out by the State Board of Health, and, of course, is backed by that body.

Miss Beam says that it is hoped that the people will realize the importance of taking the advice of the nurse and the physicians, and that the parents and guardians of the children will be careful to have the defects remedied.

Dr. Malloy says that a clinic will be held in the county next summer for the treatment of those children who need attention, who do not get relief before that time. He says two clinics have been held in the county before, and that it is no new thing. Wonders were worked in the other two clinics, said Dr. Malloy, which makes those who know the importance of this health work anxious to have another next summer. Many children have been relieved of a handicap which would have prevented both their best physical and mental development.

Those who know the value which this health work has been to other counties say they hope the parents and teachers will give every encouragement to Miss Beam, the health nurse, and that her advice and instructions with reference to the medical attention needed by the children will receive every consideration.

Dr. Malloy says there has been a wonderful improvement in the children examined three years ago. Adenoids, tonsils and defective eyes have been treated and many a child relieved of hindrances which would have held them back in their studies, and in the race of life.
