A long felt need for a quiet and agreeable lodging for the sick amongst us will soon be supplied in the structure now going up on the campus for this purpose very desirably situated near the North-west corner of the campus. When finished, the indisposed, the drooping, the lame and the halting may retreat thither to recruit unmolested by the bustle and racket continually going on around the college buildings.

When completed, the structure will contain five commodious rooms with a spacious hallway separating a larger and a smaller room from three smaller ones. The larger room will be supplied with cots and such other furniture as may be needful, to render it a genial and refreshing quarter for the slightly indisposed yet unfit for duty. Adjacent to this a drawing-room will be suitably furnished. Of the others there will be the sick-room, and adjoining that a room designed and fitted up to accommodate visiting members of sick ones' families, and a parlor.

The walls of the interior will be tar-paper lined and plastered, and the interior wood finished in oil.

The structure is cottage, and a profusion of gables renders it architecturally pleasing in appearance. It was designed by Prof. Gore, and an examination shows it to be well adapted for the purpose in hand. It will be ready for occupancy shortly.

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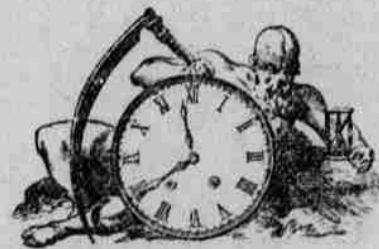
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
