Historical Society.

The second meeting of the Historical Society for this year was called to order at 7:30 p. m. Tuesday evening by Dr. K. P. Battle, President. The Secretary read the minutes of last meeting. The President announced as the first paper of the evening, The Running of the Boundary Line between Virginia and North Carolina, by Mr. F. Shaffner. The paper was an interesting one. Mr. Shaffner described in detail the work of the Commissioners, telling of their many hardships and trials, especially in

running the line through the dismal swamp, a distance of fifteen miles.

Mr. W. B. Lemly read a paper on the Moravians in North Carolina. He traced the history of these people in the State from the time that Count Zinzendorf bought a tract of land from Lord Granville, on which to settle his brethren that they might enjoy religious freedom, through their early settlement down to the present day. He showed how Salem was founded in 1769 according to the plans of the Count. His paper was a very valuable one and was listened to with much interest.

Mr. Wood read a paper on the 'Acts of the Council of Safety of Wilmington, N. C., of which Cornelius Hammet was chairman.' The paper was well written.

Dr. Battle read to the Society some notes which he had taken in the Secession Convention of the State.

The meeting was well attended.

The Philological Club.

The Philological Club held its meeting for November in the English room, on Tuesday evening.

Prof. Harrington read a paper on "Word-Coinage in Naevius," who died at the beginning of the 2nd century B. C. Comments on the paper were made by Profs. Hume and Toy.

Prof. Toy presented a review of Keller's *Bilder aus der Deutschen Litteratur*, a new book on German Litterature. The book gives in a readable style a survey of the whole subject.

Dr. Hume called attention to Barrett Wendell's book on English Composition.

Mr. Wills spoke of Bucklen's "Practical Exercises in English," intended to supplement A. S. Hill's "Foundations of Rhetoric."

Prof. Harrington called attention to some valuable libraries to be sold in Leipsic.

Prof. Ball called attention to a valuable article—"A Plea for the Study of Latin Grammar," in *The Nation* of Nov. 21.

After a general Conference, the Club adjourned.
