Varsity vs. Guilford College.

makes off-side play, ball going to Carolina.

Carolina failing to gain, Belden punts. Cowles catches and advances the ball 20 yards. Guilford loses 1 yard (Wright reaching over and tackling the player). Guilford makes poor punt, Best quickly falling on ball; Busbee skirts end for 5 yards; Haywood, by a brilliant dash of 30 yards, behind beautiful interference, scores a touchdown. Belden kicks pretty goad.

Score: Carolina 6, Guilford 4.
Time: 5 minutes.

Guilford punts 35 yards. Belden receiving, punts back. Guilford goes through center for 3 yards; Tomlinson loses 3 yards; Jordan makes poor punt. Ball goes outside. U. N. C.'s ball on Guilford's 45 yard line. Haywood skirts Hill's end and by a beautiful run of 45 yards makes a touchdown. Belden kicks goal.

Score: U. N. C. 12, Guilford 4.
Time: 3 minutes.

Guilford kicks 35 yards; Belden, catching the ball, punts back. Guilford fails to gain on 1st down, makes 3 yards on 2nd and 2 on 3rd. Ball goes over to Carolina. Umpire calls time.

Score: Carolina 12, Guilford 4.

Belden punts off; Kerner catches Rogers tackling before he can advance it. Cowles makes 1 yard through left tackle; Cowles gains 3 yards; Guilford fumbles, Bagwell, R., falling on the ball. Haywood, following a beautiful interference makes a brilliant dash of 35 yards round Hill's end. Belden fails to kick goal.

Score: U. N. C. 16, Guilford 4.

Guilford kicks off, Wright catches and passes the ball to Belden who punts; Hill catches, Rogers rushing down and tackling him in his tracks; Cowles makes a pretty dash of 10 yards around left end.

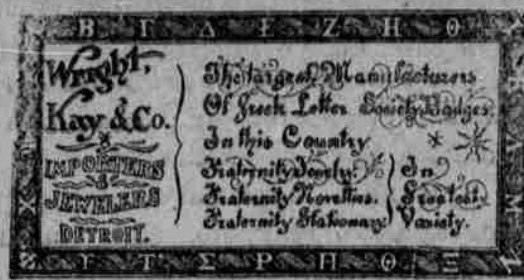
Guilford punts on 3rd down; ball goes out-side, White falling on the ball; ball goes over to Guilford on Carolina's failure to gain. Guilford fumbles, Rogers quickly falling on the ball; Carolina loses 5 yards; Haywood makes pretty run of 29 yards placing the ball on Guilford's 2 yard line; Bagwell, E. E. scores touchdown; Belden fails to kick goal. Score Carolina 20; Guilford 4.

Guilford kicks 40 yards; Green catches, advancing the ball 10 yards; Carolina failing to gain, Belden punts 25 yards; Hockett touches the ball but fails to hold it; White quickly falls on the ball; Haywood supported by good blocking scores a touchdown; Belden kicks goal. Score Carolina 26; Guilford 4. Buxton goes in the game taking Haywoods place.

Guilford kicks 40 yards; Belden receiving makes brilliant dash of 30 yards; Rogers loses 10 yards; Rogers makes 15 yards but loses the ball.

Guilford's ball; Tomlinson makes 3 yards; Cowles skirts R. E. for 6 yards; Guilford in the next 11 downs plunges through our line for 26 yards. The game was then called with the ball on Carolina's 2 yard line.

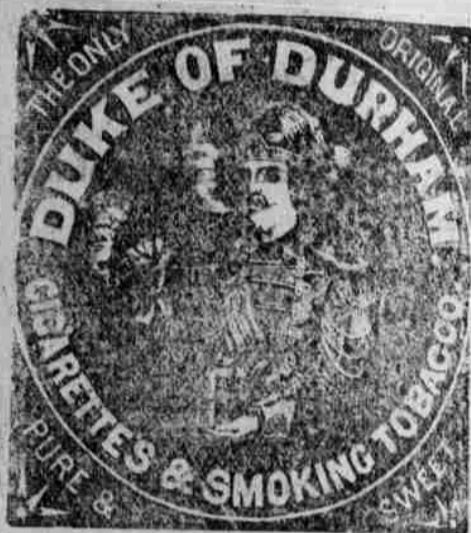
