The vigor with which the work was pushed, makes us wish that Prof. Holmes was behind more of our enterprises. To him inactivity and failure are unknown terms.

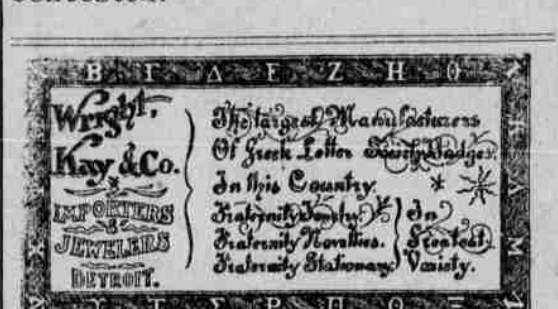
