Show the Way to Victory.

The gritty little Princetonian who, for the past three weeks, has been coaching the candidates for the 'Varsity, is in earnest, and the conscientious work he is doing has pleased every student in the Univer-

Will A. Reynolds, Princeton '97, was substitute quarter-back of the famous '93 Princeton Varsity. His light weight prevented his selection as a member of the 'Varsity, so he early began coaching teams away

His first work in this line was coaching the Rutgers, '94, which team defeated our 'Varsity by a man here. score of 5 to 0.

In 1895, when the team we sent out was acknowledged to be the best in the history of the sport here, when "Doggy" Trenchard had developed a line that was invincible and backs/ that would make our name by-words, when we lost only one game, Reynolds was coaching Sewanee. The '95 Princeton 'Varsity quarter-back, Trenchard, was mak ing victors of Tar Heels and the '97 literary culture in the University Prin eton sub-quarter-back, Reynolds was sending out from, Sewanee a right worthy band of pigskin pushers. The two teams met and Princeton tactics met Princton tactics, resulting in a tie game, neither University scoring. That alone is enough to show the ability of Mr. Reynolds as a coach, but there are other glories which might be mentioned, among them the glorious rec-Cincinnati last year.
