UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA.

CAROLINA, 14; GUILFORD, 1.

In Saturday's game against Guilford College our team sustained the fair record which she seems determined to make this season by making a score of fourteen to her opponent's one.

The contest was not close enough to furnish very intense excitement but the game was good.

Harkins and Lawson pitched well.

The game began at 1:45 P. M. and was finished in time for the afternoon train.

The game was played as follows:

1st Inning—Carolina at the bat. Rogers gets base on balls. Hits by Winston, Lawson and Woodard bring in two runs. Woodard scores on error. Graves by three base hit and stealing home scores another run and brings in Lambeth before the side is retired.

Daniels makes a beautiful two base hit but Short, Jas. and John Fox retire the side.

Score—Carolina, 5; Guilford, 0.

2nd Inning. Rogers strikes out. Winston out at first. Lawson gains second but Woodard retires the side.

Foust flies out. Lambeth's wild throw gives Barbee second base. Parker flies out to Woodard who throws to Alston and retires side on double play.

Score—Carolina, 5; Guilford, 0.

3rd Inning. Hits by Graves and Rogers and two errors by Guilford give Carolina three runs. Lawson's strike out retires the side.

Moir, Mendenhall and Short are out on flies.

Score—Carolina, 8; Guilford, 0.

4th Inning. Woodard leads with a hit to right field. Outs by Lambeth and Graves. Woodard is caught stealing third.

Daniels out at first. John Fox makes first. Woodard's error gives Jas. Fox his base. Foust hits to short and John Fox scores on close decision. Fox thrown out at third. Parker flies out to Woodard.

Score—Carolina, 8; Guilford, 1.

5th Inning. Alston out at first. Allison hits safe. Rogers out on bunt and Winston flies out to right field.

Moir out at first. Mendenhall safe on Alston's error. Allison makes beautiful catch of Short's fly. Daniels out at first.

Score—Carolina, 8; Guilford, 1.

6th Inning. In this inning Woodard hits safe to center-field but outs by Lawson, Rogers (running for Lambeth) and Graves retire side.

Brem goes to right-field and Lawson goes in the box.

John Fox and Foust strike out. Jas. Fox hits out to first.

Score—Carolina, 8; Guilford, 1.

7th Inning. Alston scores on short stop's error and pitcher's wild throw. Allison Brem and Rogers retire side.

Lawson throws four balls and Guilford retires.

Score—Carolina, 9; Guilford, 1.

8th Inning.

Winston gains first on Short's error. Lawson hits safe. Winston scores on Woodard's hit. Lambeth and Graves out. Lawson and Woodard score. Alston makes first on error. Brem walks. Alston and Allison come in on Roger's hit. Winston flies out.

Mendenhall, Short and Daniels out at first.

9th Inning.

Lawson flies out. Woodard out at first. Lambeth walks. Graves flies out to centre.

John and Jas. Fox fly out. Foust safe on Lambeth's error. Barbee hits safe to right. Parker flies out to Brem.
