Olympian Games.

The official programme of the Olympian Games which will be held at Paris. during the Exposition next summer, has been received by the management of the Princeton Track Association. The sports will begin on May 27, and continue These include until October 27. professional and amateur track and field games, Rugby and Association football, hockey, cricket, lawn tennis, croquet, bowling, baseball, lacrosse and golf.

The events in which the Princeton team will compete are as follows: 110 metres hurdle, 100 metres dash, 400 metres, 800 metres, 1500 metres, 400 metres hurdle, 2500 metres steeple chase, high jump, broad jump, pole vault, putting shot and throwing the discus. The above are world's championship events and will take place on July 15, 17, 19 and 22. The prizes will be objects of art and medals, valued as follows: For the track events, first prize, 400 francs, second prize, 200 francs, third prize, 50 francs. The valuation of prizes for the field events is: First prize, 250 francs, and 80 francs for the second prize.

In addition to the championship event the following special events will be held: 4000 metres steeple chase, 200 metres dash 60 metres, dash, throwing the hammer, 200 metres hurdle and triple jump. A special feature will be an international relay race of 5000 metres, between teams composed of five men each running 1000 metres. The prize in this race is valued at Princeton will be 1000 francs. represented in all of these events, and in all probability will have two men on the All-American relay

The entries for all professional and amateur events are closed by June 14, 1900.

The Princeton team will sail for Paris about June 15, and during the games, will be quartered at a suburb of Paris, the place not yet being determined.
