Tulane Letter.

Your newsy letter of the fourth was received by us last week, and read with much interest. On our side we hope to do our part in the maintenance of the correspondence so well begun by you.

All Tulane is waiting eagerly for the decision of President Alderman in regard to our presidency. Very few of us down here know anything of him but what rumor and reputation tell. The work which he has done at your University is something of which he may well feel proud, and your reluctance to have him leave you is another testimonial to his worth and ability. We are encouraged by these facts to believe that President Alderman is the very man we want,—young, energetic, capable, cultured, a gentleman; and while we repeat to you your kindly wish, "success in all things," yet we think that, should President Alderman accept the presidency of Tulane, his presence and his work here would serve to bring our Universities closer together and to create new bonds between us.

We are just on the brink of our baseball season which has not as yet, been formally opened. We have played several practice games with various strong amateur teams of the city, however, and have won all of them by large scores. The regular baseball season with us will be only of moderate length this year, chiefly because of our financial losses in our football season. A number of games with neighboring Universities have been arranged, however, and we hope to come out victorious in many, if not all, of them. This 1900 ball team, under the captaincy of G. G. Westfeldt, '01, is considered one of the strongest Tulane has ever produced.

On May 11, the annual contest of the Gulf-States Inter-Collegiate Oratorical Association will be held at the Louisiana State University, Baton Rouge. This will make the fourth annual contest of the association. In two of the previous three Tulane's representatives have carried off the honors. The Universities belonging to the oratorical association are the University of Mississippi, University of Alabama, University of Georgia, University of Louisiana, and Tulane. All of these institutions will most probably send speaker's to this year's meeting. Tulane's representative will be Mr. Ralph J. Schwarz, '02, and through him, we hope to duplicate our success of past years.

Two associations rather unique among Southern colleges have recently been organized at Tulane. One is a "Greek Circle" having for its object the study of the topics connected with the literature and social life of ancient Greece. It meets monthly and hears papers read by the members. The second association referred to is the "Press Club," organized for the purpose of elevating the standard of Tulane's journals, and for the secondary purpose of entertaining and visiting athletic teams. Both organizations are thriving and bid fair to accomplish much good each in its own way.

The Tulane Athletic Association has invited the members

of the Track Team of the University of California to stop in New Orleans on their way back from the big inter-collegiate meet in New York, early in May. We wish them to participate in our track games. So far, we have received no reply to our invitations from the Californians. We have exceptionally good material for a track team this year, and should manage to make a creditable showing if the men train faithfully.

Tulane has recently received from Mrs. Caroline Stannard Tilton fifty thousand dollars to be devoted to the erection of a library in memory of the donor's husband. This amount is to be devoted wholly to the building—no part of it is to be used for the purchase of books, of which we already have about fifteen thousand. This memorial library will prove a handsome addition to the group of buildings comprising our college of art and sciences and technology. If Dame Rumor speaks true, this will not be the only improvement we are to have, for report says that Tulane is to be developed and enlarged by the building of dormitories and a gymnasium in the near future.
