DR. MCIVER DEAD.

University Loses a Loyal Son and the State an Excellent Citizen.

On the Bryan Special between Durham and Hillsboro, Dr. Chas. D. McIver, President of the State Normal College of Greensboro, died suddenly of appoplexy about halfpast three o'clock Monday afternoon. Both the state and the University suffer greatly in his loss. For years Dr. McIver had been one of the leading spirits in the educational movement in the state. Perhaps there is no one whose work could be more greatly missed in that field.

Dr. McIver graduated at his state University in 1881, and although his life has since been a busy one he has never forgotten his alma mater. Every commencement brought him back to the Hill, and he was always a principal speaker at the Alumni banquet. In 1893 he received the degree of L.L.D. conferred by the University of North Carolina. The tolling of the college bell at noon on Tuesday, the hour of the funeral, reminded every student on the campus how great was our loss, as well as the state's. In the future he will be missed here especially.
