

COST OF Y. M. C. A. BUILDING.

Figures to Date—What it Will Cost to Finish Up.

When a man contributes to a cause he naturally wants to know what is done with the money he has put into it. Every man who has contributed to the Y. M. C. A. Building Fund has the satisfaction of seeing with his own eyes where his money has gone and what it has been able to do.

There are a number of questions, however, that have been asked, the answers to which are of interest to others than the inquirers. Some of the questions asked are: "How much did the building cost?" "How much more is needed to finish everything about the Building?" "Is there any debt on the Building?" "How have the fellows paid up?" "Whom must I pay my subscription to?" in answer to which the Tar Heel can give the following facts:

The total paid in on the Building Fund to date is \$12,182.36. The total paid out on the building and furniture to date is \$11,820.26. The amount of cash in hand now is \$362.10. Obligations are now payable or have been contracted to the amount of \$700.00, so the Building Committee needs about \$350.00 more than it has to pay obligations already contracted.

The above figures do not include the heating system, which the committee is now making plans to instal, the furnishing of the chapel, the finishing of the attic and basement, or the plumbing of the building. The heating system, which is the next and most pressing item, will require about \$1,200.00 or more, the chapel can be rendered useful by an expenditure of \$500.00, or can be furnished handsomely with \$2,000.00 or more, and the remainder which is not so pressing, can be done with \$600.00.

No debt has been incurred. Although obligations that have been contracted amount to more than the cash in hand, it is expected that by the time these bills mature the money will be in the treasurer's hands to pay them. No bill has yet become due that the committee was not able to pay. Unless the unredeemed pledges are paid promptly the committee will be unable to instal the heating system, however.

All of the fellows haven't "paid up" yet. Over four-fifths of the subscriptions have been paid, but some of the subscribers have been a little slow about redeeming their pledges. Those who have not paid and who wish to do so should pay the amounts to Major W. T. Patterson, treasurer.
