

The course, which covers a period of four years, of eight and one-half months each, is eminently practical, and properly graded, beginning with laboratory instruction in the fundamental subjects, and concluding with a comprehensive system of clinical instruction, terminating in the Fourth Year with the assignment of students

as clinical clerks in the Hospital. A large proportion (at least 80 per cent.) of the graduating classes secure positions as Resident Physicians in Hospitals.

Summer School for Graduates. The clinics and laboratories of this Department are open throughout the year for the behefit of those who wish to engage in graduate work. For those whose time is more limited, a comprehensive course is given, beginning this year May 14, and continuing for a period of six weeks. This course is designed to meet the needs of the practioner.
