**Geological Journal Club.**

The Geological Journal Club held a largely attended and interesting meeting Tuesday evening at 7:00 P. M. Mr. E. B. Jeffress gave an account of the lignate coals of North Dakota, Mr. J. E. Pogue, Jr., reviewed a paper on the northward extension of preglacial deposits, and Mr. E. E. Randolph reviewed in an interesting way Branner's review of Chamberlin and Salisbury's Geology.

Professor Collier Cobb gave an account of the recent explorations in Turkestan by Pumpelly, Davis, and Huntington under the direction of the Carnegie Institution, discovering many ancient sand-buried cities, and also an account of Mr. Huntington's later work, and of the recent survey and exploration in Seistan, by Col. Sir Henry McMahon.

**The Magazine.**

The first issue of the University Magazine for the current year appeared early in the week. With this issue the cover designed for the Magazine last year has been discarded in favor of the cover under which it appeared for so long a period prior to 1900. The cover now in use, which is a very tasteful and appropriate one, was designed by Prof. Collier Cobb, who was at one time editor-in-chief of the Magazine, and who devoted much of his time to its interests while he was a student in the University.

In make up the Magazine is very well balanced, the material of light and that of heavy nature being properly proportioned. On the whole the Magazine board is to be congratulated on having got out such a creditable first issue.

**Undergraduate Department.** The One Hundred and Forty-first Session will begin September 28, 1906. The course, which covers a period of four years, of eight and one-half months each, is eminently practical, and properly graded, beginning with laboratory instruction in the fundamental subjects, and concluding with a comprehensive system of clinical instruction, terminating in the Fourth Year with the assignment of students as clinical clerks in the Hospital.

A large proportion (at least 80 per cent.) of the graduating classes secure positions as Resident Physicians in Hospitals.

**Summer School for Graduates.** The clinics and laboratories of this Department are open throughout the year for the benefit of those who wish to engage in graduate work. For those whose time is more limited, a comprehensive course is given, beginning this year May 14, and continuing for a period of six weeks. This course is designed to meet the needs of the practitioner.
