THE proposition recently made the student body of instituting a two-dollar membership fee for the Athletic Association should be considered seriously. Such a fee would put into the hands of the Association a sum sufficient to secure the services of a general director of athletics to train the class teams, track, and tennis teams, which today have practically no coaching. Next year the University intends to prepare the field southeast of the Carr building for the use of the class teams and to turn the field in the rear of the gymnasium into tennis courts. Given these grounds and the director of athletes Carolina would have a system for the development of athletics that would soon make her the foremost Southern college in athletics, instead of one of the foremost. The University will aid by preparing the grounds; let the students do their part by securing the director of athletics.

SATURDAY afternoon we have the first baseball game of the season. It is not a big one, but let's go out in a body and give our team a send-off so that they may know who is behind them when they go up against Wake Forest a week later. Let the rooting be the proper sort, too; no individual rooting or "hacking", but solid, systematic giving of college yells such as will make the fellows lean up against the ball and swat it clean to Chat-ham. That's the kind that wins games and gives the other team the chance, at the same time, which it deserves.

In a recent issue of THE TAR HEEL appeared an article by Coach Simmons on base-running. This was the first of a series of articles on the theory of the game which the coach is going to write for the benefit of all those interested in playing baseball. The first of the series was well worth while from this standpoint, and it will pay the class team men as well as those of the Varsity squad to be on the lookout for those to follow.

IT HAS been suggested that the exchanges of the University Magazine and THE TAR HEEL be placed at the service of the students.

This is done as largely as possible now. As soon as THE TAR HEEL's exchanges have been clipped they are placed upon the table of the reading room in the Y. M. C. A. building. The Magazine's exchanges may be found in the Magazine room in the same building, where all are free to read them, provided that none of the exchanges be removed from the room.

Mrs. Patterson's Address.

Mrs. Lindsay Patterson, of Winston-Salem, addressed the Modern Literature Club last Thursday night on "The Character of Confucius." Dr. Archibald Henderson, in his introduction, spoke of the Patterson Cup, the gift of Mrs. Patterson, as having served to give more impulse to the cause of literary composition in the State than has any other one influence.

Mrs. Patterson said that on having been invited to address the Club some time ago she had felt some misgivings as to her courage being sufficient to enable her to face a University audience. She had expressed this apprehension to Professor Cobb who, with characteristic gallantry, had replied. "Why, Mrs. Patterson, you need have no fears on that score; if you will only come I will hold your hand through the ordeal." "Now, Professor Cobb," said she, "I am here, and you are not keeping your part of the contract." Although Professor Cobb still failed to carry out his promise Mrs. Patterson found herself able to give a very entertaining address on "The Character of Confucius." Her address showed that she had devoted much study to the preparation of her subject.

Advisory Committee.

At a recent meeting of the Advisory Committee it was decided that the Athletic Association should aid the class baseball teams this spring by appropriating one dollar for every two dollars subscribed by the members of the different classes, the maximum appropriation for any class to be ten dollars.

Mr. F. B. Rankin, the graduate member of the Advisory Committee, was elected general manager of the class teams. The chief duty of this officer will be to assist the managers of the different class teams in arranging the class championship schedule for the spring.

A petition from the Senior class to the effect that the Senior team be allowed to take a trip during the spring was voted upon unfavorably. As heretofore, there will be only two class team games off the Hill this year. The Freshmen will be allowed to take their usual trip, and a trip will be granted to the class team winning the championship.

In the future all continuous reports will be held under the management of the Athletic Association. During the fall the manager of the baseball team will have charge of the reports and during the spring they will be in charge of the manager of the football team, the manager, in each case, to receive fifty percent of the profits in payment for his services.
