Mrs. Lindsay Patterson, of Winston-Salem, addressed the Modern Literature Club last Thursday night on "The Character of Confucius." Dr. Archibald Henderson, in his introduction, spoke of the Patterson Cup, the gift of Mrs. Patterson, as having served to give more impulse to the cause of literary composition in the State than has any other one influence.

Mrs. Patterson said that on having been invited to address the Club some time ago she had felt some misgivings as to her courage being sufficient to enable her to face a University audience. She had expressed this apprehension to Professor Cobb who, with characteristic gallantry, had replied.
