**Appropriation Increased.**

Shortly before its closing session the Legislature passed the appropriation bill, one clause of which provides for the increase of the State's annual appropriation for the support of the University from \$45,000 to \$70,000. Besides this the amount of \$25,000 was voted for this year for the purpose of making permanent improvements in the equipment of the institution.
