### Two Lectures.

Professor J. H. Gore of George Washington University, brother of Professor J. W. Gore, head of the Department of Physics at the University of North Carolina, delivered a very instructive lecture in Gerard Hall Tuesday night on the subject of "Holland and its Queen." Professor Gore is thoroughly conversant with the life and language of the people of Holland and his discussion of the political and economic struggle of the indomitable little state was a valuable one to the student. The lecture was illustrated by lantern-slides made from views taken by the speaker himself. Last night Professor Gore spoke before the Elisha Mitchell Scientific Society on the subject "Within the Arctic Circle."
