After the adjournment of the conference a crowd of thirty took a climb to the top of Mt. Mitchell, and a strenuous climb it was. The crowd started from Black Mountain Station with a guide and two pack horses at ten o'clock in the morning. The route lay up and down such peaks as Gray Beard, Pinnacle, Clingam and others and finally up Mt. Mitchell. From six to eight o'clock in the evening the straggling and exhausted climbers reached the top with "Big" Rankin nobly bringing up the rear. After a farewell look at the Mitchell monument erected on the very top of the mountain, the crowd began its rough journey back to Black Mountain Station, twenty miles distant.
