He has been on the lecture platform forty-four years, and averaged two hundred lectures a year, besides preaching to the thousands who throng his church, the Baptist Temple of Philadelphia. He has a number of excellent lectures.

Hon. Arthur K. Peck, of Boston, will fill the last date in the series some time in March. Mr. Peck will deliver an illustrated travel talk. He has six lectures, four of which have to do with the western part of our country, one with "Our New England Alps," and one with the life saving service on our coast. It has not yet been decided which he will deliver here.
