Undergraduate Department. The One Hundred and Forty-second Session will begin September 27, 1907. The course, which covers a period of four years, of eight and one-half months each, is eminently practical, and properly graded, beginning with laboratory instruction in the fundamental subjects, and concluding with a comprehensive system of clinical instruction, terminating in the Fourth Year with the assignment of students as clinical clerks in the Hospital as clinical clerks in the Hospital.
