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THURSDAY morning the University was saddened by a telegram announcing the death of Colonel Richard Benbury Creecy, its oldest alumnus. With all its tensive and hurried throb, the great heart of the University stopped for a while in respect, and a hush came over the campus. At noon that day "the college bell For a comrade gone Tolled out a knell."

SATURDAY is the last day of the fall session on which you can hand in your name for membership in the Athletic Association. Every student in the University, who will stop for a moment to consider the vital relation of athletics to University life, will not fail to become a member of the organization whose specific purpose is the efficient management of University athletics. The Athletic Association finances athletics, elects the managers of the athletic teams, awards sweaters, and publishes the college weekly.

It is incumbent upon every student to join the Association and have a part in these things. Every student who feels the responsibility of his college citizenship, will by Saturday night have his name on the treasurer's book with a "\$1.00 pd." attachment.

The one dollar fee is a barrier to none. Every student has a dollar to spare. He spends that much on trivial things and never questions his ability to do it. Why question it then when spent for such a worthy purpose? At some colleges the fee is five dollars and compulsory at that. The voluntary one dollar fee is not prohibitive here. Failure to join is a failure to perform a duty of college citizenship. It is a charge not against poverty, but against patriotism.

THE fight which the Varsity made Monday was of the right sort. It was an uphill fight. Swept off its feet in the first three minutes of play the Varsity came back into the game with a spirit and a dash that the plucky sons of Georgetown could not withstand. The first half ended six to six and in the second half both teams played fast, snappy ball but neither could score again. It was indeed a game of the genuinely stirring kind; no quarter was given, and none taken.

SATURDAY afternoon we will have a chance to see the Varsity play the second game of the three games to be played on the local gridiron this season. Since the first game with Wake Forest there has of course been wonderful improvement. Particularly strong on defense the team is developing the aggressiveness and dash which was lacking in the early games.

THE scrub team leaves to-morrow for Asheville where it plays two games. The TAR HEEL wishes the members of the scrub team the best of success on this trip. They have worked hard and without applause. They have lately been giving the Varsity some hard tussles and are responsible to a considerable extent for the improved offensive work. The scrubs deserve the outing and we hope that they will win fresh laurels from the mountain boys.

Third:—A copy of these resolutions shall be sent to his family, to "The Independent," to "The Tar Heel," to "The University Magazine," and to the state papers; and a copy shall be written in the records of the Philanthropic Society.

The Athletic Association—Its Object, Membership, and Fee

ARTICLE I—NAME AND OBJECT.

Section 1. This organization shall be known as The Athletic Association of the University of North Carolina.

Sec. 2. Its object shall be the efficient management of the University's athletics and fostering of high ideals among the students.

ARTICLE II—MEMBERSHIP.

Sec. 1. Any student or member of the Faculty of the University may become a member of the Association. Provided, he applies for membership on or before November 1st of each collegiate year; Provided, that students entering in the Spring Term may apply for membership on or before March 1st.

ARTICLE III—FEES.

Sec. 1. Each member of the Association shall be required to pay an annual fee of one dollar.

Sec. 2. The annual fee shall be paid on or before November 1st, and if not paid then shall be doubled by the treasurer; and if said fee be not paid by December 1st, the delinquent members shall be disfranchised for the remainder of the collegiate year, provided, that those men who join in the Spring Term shall be allowed until March 1st to pay their fees; but if said fees be not paid by March 1st, they shall be doubled; and if they be not paid by April, the delinquent members shall be disfranchised for the remainder of the collegiate year.

Scrubs Leave Tomorrow

The Scrubs will leave for Asheville Friday afternoon. On Saturday they will meet the strong Bingham School team, and on Monday the Asheville School eleven. These are the two strongest prep. elevens in the State, and so far no team has been able to cross the goal-line of either. Asheville School has just trimmed the Tennessee Scrubs 18 to 0; and Bingham defeated them 11 to 0. So it will be seen that the Scrubs have two strong foes to face. Last year the Scrubs defeated Asheville School 11 to 4, and lost to Bingham 6 to 0.

Mr. Holladay Chosen.

The Yackety Yack board has at last decided upon its official photographer. The contract again goes to Mr. Waller Holladay, the popular college photographer of Durham. This year the photographer was selected upon a competitive basis and will probably be thus selected in the future. Almost all the classes voted that they would abide by the decision of the Yackety Yack committee. The board asks that all the students individually and collectively co-operate with the board and Mr. Holladay in their endeavor to make the pictures of individuals and groups uniform and attractive. It is planned to have a large number of the pictures taken this fall in order to insure an early publication of the Yackety Yack.

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
