### The University Sermon

Bishop Robert Strange of Wilmington preached the University Sermon in Chapel Sunday night. In spite of extremely disagreeable weather his audience filled the house an evidence of Bishop Strange's popularity among us. Those who heard his sermon in no way repented what uncomfortableness may have been experienced in so doing. Bishop Strange took as his text; Romans, 8, 28, "We know that all things work together for the best of those who love God." He undertook to show that what appears to be a misfortune on the surface may be and is to the man who loves God a blessing though disguised.

The Bishop said that misfortune as punishment served first of all as a preventative of evil, then that it served as a means of opening up channels for progress, finally that through trouble only was a man of character developed, that continual prosperity is the worst of curses, "The struggles for existence have developed the world as we have it. Struggles develop men who work, who think, who sympathize, who develop civilization. The purpose of creation is to make a man—a Christ-like man who puts getting to give before getting to keep. Such a man can meet the good things without spoiling and the hard things without souring.

### CHAPEL HILL vs. GRAHAM

The question of abolishing capital punishment in North Carolina was finally settled last Friday night.
