North Carolina Review

The Raleigh News and Observer for October 3rd brought out with it in the form of a supplement, the first number of the North Carolina Review. The North Carolina Review is henceforth to be published monthly as a supplement to the News and Observer but it may be secured separately. The Review is a literary digest, in a way, of new North Carolina books and publications. In its own words; "The North Carolina Review is ambitious enough to hope that it may contribute something to that literary and historical renaissance which is sure to come to North Carolina and the South before many years; that it may be a medium of expression for those who are to create that literature which is to place North Carolina's history in the proper light before the world and rescue from their obscurity her neglected leaders of the past."

The Review, to the students of the University, is especially interesting because of the fact that on its editorial staff are two members of the University faculty, Prof. E. K. Graham and Prof. J. G. DeR. Hamilton, both of whom are associate editors. Also the articles contained in the first edition are chiefly written by members of the University faculty. On the first page of this first edition of the Review we see several articles under the head, Familiar Talks about Men and Books. This department is in the hands of Prof. Graham. Another long and conspicuous article is by Dr. Archibald Henderson on, New Honor for Christian Reid, which deals with the honor lately done this famous North Carolina author by the Notre Dame College of Illinois. Other articles by members of the faculty which are contained in the review are: Hayne and His Times, by Prof. J. G. De Roulhac Hamilton; Carolina's Slave Poet, by Prof. C. Cobb; The Library and University Life, by Dr. L. R. Wilson; The Awakening and its Causes, by Prof. Hamilton; and an article on the state library commission by Dr. L. R. Wilson. The Review also contains a review of Prof. N. W. Walker's book on James Johnston Pettigrew. The Review has received much favorable criticism from various sources. It may be of great value to North Carolina.
