Class tennis tournaments fast turning out class tennis team
Fast series promised

Thanksgiving week will not be so dull after all. The Y. M. C. A. Lyceum Committee has secured Caveny and Co. as its first attraction for the year, and they will perform here Tuesday night November 23. This entertainment promises to be equal to that given by Packard three years ago.

Caveny and Company were in Charlotte last year and will appear there again tonight. This we think is sufficient endorsement. Five men have entered the senior class tournament: J. W. Lasley, D. B. Teague, O. W. Hyman, E. F. Roderiguez, R. C. Dellinger and W. A. Darden. Of these Hyman and Lasley seem the most promising candidates at present. Both have been members of their class teams before.

In the Junior tournament there are the following men: A. B. Rhodes, J. B. Colvard, K. B. Bailey, M. B. Wyatt, L. B. Whitaker, W. B. Ellis, R. T. Webb, J. M. Battle and R. G. Stockton. Just now it seems that Bailey and Wyatt or Whitaker have the best chance to make the team. Of these Bailey was on his class team last year.

For the Sophomore tournament the following men have entered: J. C. Lockhart, F. P. Barker, J. C. Lanier, Jack Hobgood, C. S. Cooke, and H. Grimsley. Hobgood and Barker seem the most promising candidates. Neither has ever represented his class before.

CUP FOR JOURNALISTIC CONTEST INTRODUCED TO STUDENTS

Athletic Association and Thank-giving football game come up for serious consideration

The devotional exercises this week have been conducted by Mr. Royal. Short talks have been made each day by the President, while on Monday Prof. E. K. Graham also spoke for a few minutes.

On Monday Dr. Venable spoke of the death of Archer Christian, Virginia's left half back. The President's impressive words but expressed the keen sorrow of the students at the unfortunate accident. Dr. Venable said that the death of Bryne, of West Point, and the injury of so many other players caused a serious pause. "I do not know what the result will be, nor is this the place to say," said the President, "but something must and will be done."

Professor Graham then spoke, congratulating the tennis team on its successful invasion of Virginia. Prof. Graham showed us the Benj. Smith Preston memorial cup, offered each year by Mr. E. R. Preston, of Charlotte, to the undergraduate student who attained the highest rank in journalistic work. Stipulations for the contest will be given later.

On Tuesday morning Dr. Venable spoke for a few minutes on the significance of the word "gentleman." The President said that in the first place that a man was not a gentleman because of birth, wealth, or good clothes. The title must rest on something higher. It must rest first on respect for self,—a gentleman must keep his word of honor. Still another part is courtesy; a gentleman has a high sense of the rights of others. Dr. Venable said courtesy towards woman was a cardinal principle of a Southern gentleman. How humiliating, then, has been the conduct of certain students recently in Chapel and on the campus. Such conduct does not become gentlemen, and it will work irreparable injury to Carolina.

On Wednesday Dr. Venable explained the problem which confronts the Athletic Association and the Faculty Committee on Athletics. Dr. Venable said that the first difficulty was in finding a city in which the Thanksgiving game could be played, Richmond and Washington being eliminated for obvious reasons, the choice is very limited. A second difficulty lies in finding a suitable team to play. The only college now left with which Carolina could get a game, are Lehigh and Washington and Lee. The President said that the matter would be decided Wednesday afternoon at a meeting of the committee from the committee from the Athletic Association and faculty.

Dr. Venable announced on Thursday morning that no game could be secured to take the place of the Virginia game, (Concluded on fourth page)
