

Annual Mission Study Rally

Sunday afternoon at three o'clock the Y. M. C. A. will hold in Gerrard Hall its Annual Mission Study Rally. The address will be delivered by Mr. E. T. Colton of New York City, who is Foreign Secretary of the International Committee of the Y. M. C. A. Mr. Colton was heard with great pleasure at the Rochester Convention. He is an unusually strong and able speaker. A special feature of the meeting will be a soprano solo by Miss Anice Bright of Washington, N. C. The orchestra will also assist in the music.

At this meeting the mission study work of the Association will be launched. Five courses of study covering each a term of approximately two months will be given this spring. Three of the courses will be lecture courses. The other two courses will be conducted after the manner of the Bible study courses in small groups led by students. The classes will meet weekly and the hours of meeting have been distributed through the week in order to meet the convenience of as large a number of students as possible.

The schedule of courses is as follows: "The Challenge of the City," (lecture course), led by Dr. A. H. Patterson and meeting Wednesday at 7 p.m.; "Daybreak in Turkey," (lecture course), led by Rev. R. W. Hogue and meeting Mondays at 7 p.m.; "Japan and its Regeneration," (lecture course), led by Mr. Y. Minakuchi and meeting Sundays at 4:30 p.m.; "Effective Workers in Needy Fields," (two groups), led by Messrs E. E. Barnett and D. B. Bryan and meeting Sundays at 5 p.m. and 8:15 p.m. respectively; and "Modern Apostles of Missionary Byways," (two groups), led by Messrs W. H. Ramsaur and A. R. Morgan, and meeting Sundays at 5 p.m. and Wednesday at 7 p.m. respectively. The classes will all meet in the Y. M. C. A. House.

Last year 23,000 college men in America were engaged in mission study. The interest this year is even greater than that of last year, due to the influence of the recent Convention held in Rochester and because of the unprecedented interest in missions throughout the entire church as evidenced by the Laymans' Movement. It is hoped that no student will miss the opportunity of hearing Mr. Colton Sunday afternoon and that as many as possible will enroll in the mission study classes for the next two months.

Trustees Meet

In the executive office of the Governor, who is ex-officio chairman, the Board of Trustees of the University of North Carolina Wednesday afternoon held the regular annual meeting, the session lasting from one to four o'clock.

Besides the formal election of Lucius Polk McGehee to be Dean of the University Law School and chief professor of that department, the following business was transacted:

Upon the recommendation of President Venable and it is understood, with the advice of the dean of the medical department at Raleigh and general sanction of the Raleigh physicians who have been so patriotically filling the various chairs of instruction, the trustees ordered that, after the present term expires, the Raleigh department (third and fourth years' course) of the University Medical School be discontinued.

A committee was appointed to draft resolutions on the death of Judge MacRae, late dean of the law school.

A committee of three on visitation was appointed to make its report at the next commencement of the University.

The meeting of the trustees will hereafter be held on Monday of commencement week.

The annual sermon will be delivered on Sunday, and Tuesday (instead of Wednesday) will be "Commencement Day" proper. By this arrangement three consecutive days will be covered. Heretofore Monday was an "off day"
