Bryan and meeting Sundays at $5 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. and 8:15 p.m. respectively and "Modern Apostles of Missionary Byways," (two groups), led by Messr: W. H. Ramsaur and A. R. Morgan and meeting Sundays at 5 p.m. and Weduesday at 7 p.m. respectively. The classes will all meet in the $\pi . M$. C. A. House.

The interest this year is even greater than that of last year, due to the influence of the recent Convention held in Rochester and because of the unprecedented interest in missions throughout the entire church as evidenced by the Laymans' Movement.
