### Proposed Amendments

(Continued from first page)

"Section 3. The editor-in-chief shall be elected from the rising senior class, and the assistant editor-in-chief from the rising junior class.

"Section 4. In case of a vacancy in any office provided for in section 2, by resignation or otherwise, a successor shall be chosen by a board of electors consisting of the officers of the athletic association and the editorial board of the Tar Heel.

"Section 5. All profits derived from the management of the Tar Heel shall be distributed as follows: one-third shall be paid to the association, one-third to the editor-in-chief, and one-third to the business manager.

"Section 6. A copy of each issue of the Tar Heel shall be sent to each member of the Visiting and Executive Committees of the Board of Trustees of the University of North Carolina.

"Section 7. The business manager shall be allowed seventy-five cents per annum for each subscription of the members of said committees, to be paid out of the profits accruing to the association; provided, however, that in no case shall said subscriptions exceed the amount of the profits accruing to the association.

"Section 8. The business manager of the Tar Heel shall submit to the finance committee of the association an itemized statement of the business for the year."

4. The following sub-section be added to article 5, section 3.

"(c) The secretary shall receive five dollars per annum for the strict performance of his services as enumerated above."

6. That the following article be added:

"Article VII.—Athletic advisor."  
"There shall be elected by the association a permanent athletic advisor whose duty shall be to advise with and assist the managers of the various athletic teams in arranging schedules and hotel accommodations."

7. That the title of article six be changed so as to read:

"Article VIII—Amendments."
