Council. In this way there is a thorough and careful sifting and weighing of evidence. Injustice is thus prevented.

On Tuesday Dr. Battle read the account of John the Baptist's relations with Herod, and commented briefly on them. Dr. Battle showed how John, although imprisoned by Herod, was treated kindly by the Emperor, while on the other hand, there existed a bitter feud between John and Herodias, the wife of Herod. Dr. Battle went no further into the matter at this time, promising, however, to discuss the reasons for Herod's conduct on Wednesday, and the reasons for Herodias' conduct on Thursday. After Dr. Battle had concluded, Prof. Graham read parts of a paper which was written by a senior and which consisted of statisics gathered from the four academic classes upon the matter of newspaper reading among college men. Some amusing and surprising facts were Hamilton unassisted. Hobbs walks. brought out. The paper showed that as a rule the Seniors have a pretty good idea of current events, while the Freshman have a rather hazy concept tion, to say the least, of daily happenings.

True to his promise, Dr. Battle gave the students on Wednesday the key to Herod's conduct toward John. This Herod was ruler of the country north of Judea. It was the great aim of Herod's life to become ruler over Judea, and it was, because he did not wish to excite hatred in Judea, the country John was a native of, that Herod acted as he did toward John, Prof. Graham also spoke for a few minutes. He discussed the matter of courtesy toward teams that come here to visit us and play against us. Prof. Graham cited a number of illustrations to show that courtesy is largely a relative matter, that what is rude and vulgar in one part of the country is good form in another. He said, however, that a change had taken place among college men, and that teams which came to play against the home team are now treated as visitors, representing a sister institution.

On Thursday Dr. Battle continued his talks upon the relations between Herod, Herodias, and John. Herod married Herodias in order to further his ambitious designs on the throne of Judea. Herodias was a descendant of the famous line of kings that had in former years been dethroned by the Romans. She was very ambitious, and, therefore, agreed to her husband's plans heartily. John, who was looked upon as a prophet dictating the will of God, upset these plans when he said that the marriage of Herod to Herodias was unlawful. Herod, with the larger interests of state at heart, tried to win over John. Herodias, on the other hand, was swayed by her womon's hatred. John was beheaded, and as a final result Herod was utterly

Mr. Hogue spoke on Good Friday His talk was beautiful and most fitting, He quoted striking passages from different writers, a notable one being Dr. Eliot in his New Religion, all showing that the religion of the 20 century is in harmony with the teachings of Jesus and the revelation He gave, and that Good Friday is one of the supreme days of the year.
