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## N. C. 66---Wake Forest 52

### CAROLINA TAKES NINE FIRST PLACES OUT OF THIRTEEN

Hoffman takes two seconds off state record for half mile run

Carolina won her first track meet Thursday, defeating her strongest rival, Wake Forest, by the score of 66 to 52.

A number of ladies as well as students saw the Carolina team win nine firsts, five seconds, and six thirds out of twelve events. At shortly past 10:20 the 100 yard dash began. For about sixty yards Winston led Coughenour but the Wake Forest runner spurted ahead, and broke the tape with a couple of yards lead. Time 10 3-5 seconds.

The high jump was closely contested and excitingly interesting. Hutchins and Williams seemed about equal until the bar was placed at 5 feet 6 inches which Hutchins after three efforts failed to go over.

Hoffman lived up to student expectations when he walked away with the half mile run in the fastest time made on the local track in years. Carolina's best former record was 2-7 sec. Hoffman has lowered that to 2-5.2 sec.

When Parsley had pushed his last opponent to the wall at 9 ft. 6 in., he vaulted the bar at what measured on the standards 10 ft. 2 in., a net height of 9 ft. 9 in. from rise to bar.

In the 220 yard dash Coughenour again defeated Winston, time 24 sec. flat.

Ruffin for Carolina outdistanced all and broke the tape in 17 1-5 sec. in the high hurdles.

Murchison for Wake Forest won the quarter mile in 55 1-5 sec., but Wakeley and Solomon were on his heels and gave Carolina second and third places.

Atkinson threw the hammer in good form, and by the able aid of Thompson won first and second places for Carolina in the event. Atkinson's throw measured 111 feet.

Captain Williams took the broad jump at 20 feet 1 1-2 inches.

The mile run was hotly contested. Hoffman, wearied from the half mile, was winded on the third round, and tho he went to the finish of the run, he was unable to win out as was expected even tho the final time was lower than his record in practice. Llorens' winning the race for Carolina was spectacular and roundly applauded. The Cuban took his place at the start and jogged along at a steady pace till the last lap, which he sprinted at high speed beating the Wake Forest runner easily.

Barker's run of the 220 yard hurdles was speedy. He had a good lead and finished in 29 sec.

"Big" Thompson put the shot 33 ft. 3 1-2 in. and won first place. Axley made a good showing, taking second easily.

The relay race was slow tho not featureless. Harris started for Carolina, and was outdistanced by a speedy Wake Forest runner. Grimsley when touched was off like a shot and gained some on his man, but when Thompson started, the Baptist runner was still in the front, Thompson merely

### SLOW GAME WITH SENSATIONAL PLAYING AT TIMES

Williams pitches well and gets more hits himself than opposing team

By brilliant team work and hard hitting Carolina scored 3 runs on Trinity, the Navy's conquerors of the day previous. The able pitching of "Fleet" Williams allowed the visitors no earned runs and only two safe hits. A single run was made thru Carolina's error in right field. The final score of 3 to 1 was a pleasant surprise to local fans.

Williams' pitching and hitting, Buie's throwing and head-work, Hackney's splendid catch, Duncan's fielding, Armstrong's work at third, Smith's catch of a foul to the Carolina bench were features that made the game interesting.

2nd. L'Henreux out 2nd. to 1st, Horan walks. Abbey safe on error. Olsson out 2nd to 1st. Gildersleeve lines out to 2nd.

Buie fans. Stacy singles. Caught on attempted steal. Tillett walks. Bivins fans. 1 hit, no runs.

3rd. Cook out short to 1st. Smith flies out to 3rd. Webster out 2nd. to 1st.

Hamilton, Duncan, Hackney, fly out to 3rd. right, and left respectively.

4th. Carrol singles. L'Henreux walks.

Horan and Abbey sacrifice, scoring Carrol. Olsson flies out to left. 1 hit, 1 run.

Armstrong walks. Williams singles. Buie sacrifices both runners. Stewart safe on fielder's choice. Armstrong caught at plate. Williams caught off 3rd. 1 hit, no runs.

5th. Gildersleeve out 3rd. to 1st. Cook flies out to right. Smith out pitcher to 1st.

Tillett singles to left. Bivins fans. Hamilton fouls out to catcher. Duncan flies out to pitcher. 1 hit, no runs.

6th. Webster flies out to right. Carrol flies out to center. L'Henreux flies out to short.

Hackney out pitcher to 1st. Armstrong fans. Williams singles to left. Buie forces Williams.

7th. Horan out pitcher to 1st. Abbey fans, out at 1st. Olsson safe on error. Gildersleeve flies out to right.

Stewart singles to left. Tillett sacrifices. Bivins singles to center, Stewart scoring. Bivins out on attempted steal. Hamilton singles to center. Duncan safe on fielder's choice, Hamilton caught at 3rd. 3 hits, 1 run.

8th. Cook lines out to 2nd. Smith flies
