WAKE FOREST TAKES SECOND

After winning a no hit game on Friday, Carolina went down in defeat before Wake Forest Saturday in Raleigh by the score of 2 to 1 in a thirteen inning game.

The game was a pitcher's battle in which Utley had the better. Only one hit in thirteen innings could Carolina secure. Stewart was invincible till the 8th. when two hits got Wake Forest a run. On errors Carolina tied the score in her half. Wake Forest won in the thirteenth by a hit and good base running.

The pitching of Utley, Faucette's catch in left, the batting of White and Beam, and the work of Williams at short and Buie behind the bat were features.

Carolina: Buie out to 1st unassisted. Hamilton flies out to right. Williams pops to short.

2nd. Utley out third to 1st. White out same way. Beam hit by pitched ball. King flies out to center.

Duncan fans. Bivins out 2nd to 1st. Stewart out short to 1st.

3rd. Faucette out catcher to 1st. Watkins flies out to 3rd. Edwards hits thru 3rd but is thrown out at 1st by Williams.

Hackney out to 1st unassisted. Rose fans. Arms rung fouls out to catcher.

4th. Brett out pitcher to 1st. Lee flies out to left. Utley out 2nd to 1st.

Buie singles to left. Hamilton sacrifices. Williams flies out to short. Buie takes 3rd on wild throw. Duncan out 3rd to 1st.

5th. White fans. Beam flies out to right. King out short to 1st.

Bivins out pitcher to 1st. Stewart out 2nd to 1st. Hackney flies out to center.

6th. Faucette out short to 1st. Wat-

kins out same way. Edwards out 3rd to 1st.

Rose out 2nd to 1st. Armstrong out 3rd to 1st. Buie flies out to left.

7th. Brett flies out to left. Lee fans. Utley flies out to pitcher.

Hamilton out 3rd to 1st. Williams flies out to center; Duncan to 1st.

8th. White singles to left; Beam to right. King out pitcher to 1st, White scoring. Faucette flies out to short who doubles Beam at 3rd.

Bivins safe on error, takes 2nd, goes to 3rd on passed ball, and scores on attempt to catch him off 3rd. Stewart out 3rd to 1st. Hackney out short to 1st. Rose out 3rd to 1st.

9th. Watkins fans. Edwards flies out to center. Brett out 3rd to 1st. Armstrong out short to 1st. Buie out pitcher to 1st. Hamilton out short to 1st.

10th. Lee out short to 1st. Utley flies out to center. White doubles to left, and goes to 3rd on a passed ball. Beam flies out to left.

Williams out 3rd to 1st. Duncan drives out to 2nd. Bivins out 2nd to 1st.

11th. Faucette out 3rd to 1st. King out same way. Watkins pops to Duncan.

Stewart out to 1st. Hackney out 2nd to 1st. Rose out pitcher to 1st.

12th. Edwards flies out to center. Brett flies out to 3rd. Lee safe on error. Utley forces Lee.

13th. White safe on error, steals 2nd, and goes to 3rd as no one took the throw at 2nd. Beam hits to right scoring White. Faucette and Watkins fan.

Williams fans. Duncan flies out to right, Bivins to left.
