In matters of study, however the Oxford student is placed on his own responsibility, and, for developing intellectual self-reliance, the superiorty of this system over the American plan of instruction is pointed out.

The Indian maiden Wenonah is torn between the duty to her father and her tribe and her love for the young Cherokee chief, Fraw.
