in a small round hole just large enough to receive it, and the fumes inhaled by the devotee, a very few inhalations being sufficient to produce the stupor which is the natural effect. In many localities the drug is chewed much as we chew tobacco, except that the juices are swallowed.

The interesting point was brought out in the discussion of Professor Howell's paper that morphine is a substance which cannot be made synthetically—by building it up in the laboratory. The opium seed-ball must be bruised by slashing it criss-crosswise, when a juice gradually exudes, from which, after it has dried into a powder, the drug may be extracted. All other alkaloids can be made in the laboratory. The problem in the laboratory manufacture of morphine is simply to make the elements Carbon, Hydrogen, and Oxygen properly combine together.

A public lecture on "Permanent Artistic Painting" will be delivered in the main lecture room of Chemistry Hall next Tuesday night, March 28, at 8:00 o'clock, by Mr. Maximilian Toch, of New York City, the founder of the Toch Fellowship in the department of Chemistry. The lecture will be fully illustrated by lantern slides and experiments.

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Change in Schedule

Effective, Sunday, January 29th, Schedule of Night Express will be changed. Train 16 will leave Goldsboro at 10:15 P. M., leave Kinston 11:10 P. M., leave Newbern at 12:30 A. M., and arrive in Washington at 2:10 A. M., arrive Norfolk 8:00 A. M.

Train 15 will leave Washington at 2:30 A. M., arrive New Bern at 4:05 P. M., leave New Bern at 4:10 A. M., arrive Kinston 5:28 A. M., arrive Goldsboro at 6:20 A. M.

Eastbound train No. 16 leaving Goldsboro at 10:15 P. M., will receive connection from the Southern Railway and A. C. L. from the North and South.

Westbound train 15 will connect at Goldsboro with the Southern Railway Westbound, and with the A. C. L. North and Southbound.

Effective same date train No. 9 will leave Newbern at 5:25 P. M., leaving Kinston at 6:45 P. M., and arrive Goldsboro at 7:45 P. M.

Under this new schedule passengers may make direct connection at Goldsboro with all lines without lay-over.

The schedule of the Night Express trains Nos. 5 and 6 carrying Pullman Sleeping cars between Norfolk and Raleigh via Washington, Greenville and Wilson will remain as at present.

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
