Hasty---(Carolina) second base. Hasty is the best telding second sacker in the South Atlantic section. His hitting is timely.

Calmes (Carolina) first base. An excellent fielder possessing a wondertul arm. He will hit over .300.

Farmer (A. and M.) left field---covers all sorts of ground. Hits well over .300.

Douglas (Virginia) shortstop. He is the best fielding shortstop in this section. Bats .300.

Edwards (Carolina) third base. He goes after and gets nearly everything that comes his way. Has all grades of fight. Has a tendency to break up games every now and then with a long hit.
