

### Change Proposed In Publications' Management

A change in the business management of the student publications is being agitated. The following recommendations will be acted upon at a special meeting of the Athletic Association.

We, the committee appointed by the Fraternities, Societies, and Athletic Association to draw up a plan for the placing of the college publications upon a firmer business basis, recommend:

Art. 1. Sec. 1. That a permanent business manager of college publications, including the Yackety Yack, Tar Heel, and the Magazine, be employed, whose term of office shall be from the first day August of each year.

Sec. 2. That his official title shall be "General Business Manager" of student publications.

Sec. 3. That he shall be elected by an auditing committee hereinafter provided for.

Sec. 4. That he be required to sign a contract for three years, reserving to either contracting party the right to terminate the contract upon 30 days notice.

Art. 2. Sec. 1. That the General Business Manager's duties shall be to make all contracts, to solicit all advertising and subscriptions, to perform all other duties relative thereto and which are required of the several business managers as constituted at present.

Sec. 2. That his powers and obligations shall be the same as those of the several business managers as at present constituted.

Sec. 3. That he be required to give bond to the auditing committee hereinafter provided for, for \$5,000 in some reliable company, the cost of said bond to be counted as expense incidental to managing of the publications.

Sec. 4. That he make an annual itemized report of all business transacted for each publication separately by the 15th of September of each year, to the auditing committee.

Sec. 5. That he keep a set of books for each publication, and a capillary account of all.

Art. 3. Sec. 1. That advertisements shall be distributed among the three publications in the proportion that has obtained for the last five years in so far as the General Business Manager is able to judge.

Sec. 2. That if any misunderstanding relative to the above section arises, the auditing committee shall have final judgement.

Art. 4. Sec. 1. That in case of other college publications of any kind the auditing committee shall determine the remuneration of the General Business Manager for managing the same.

Art. 5. Sec. 1. That there be a committee known as the auditing committee.

Sec. 2. That this committee shall be composed of nine men, two to come from each of the literary societies, two from the fraternities at large and three from the Athletic Association.

Sec. 3. That the members of said committee be elected to serve two years, provided that for the first year one of the members from each organization shall be elected to serve but one year.

Sec. 4. That all elections be held by the first of October of each year.

Sec. 5. That whenever it shall become necessary to elect another permanent manager, the power to elect, and fix his salary shall be vested in the auditing committee.

Sec. 6. That all contracts between

auditing committee and said manager shall be in writing.

Sec. 7. That the auditing committee shall audit all accounts for the previous college year not later than the 15th of September.

Sec. 8. That the auditing committee shall make a report to the Societies, Fraternities, and Athletic Association immediately after the accounts have been audited.

Art. 6. Sec. 1. That the salary of the General Business Manager shall be \$1,000 per annum for the first year in addition to all expenses purely incidental to the managing of the publications.

Sec. 2. That his salary be paid 1-3 the 1st of December, 1-3 the first of April, and the remainder when the Manager's report is approved finally by the auditing committee.

Sec. 3. That his salary shall be paid by each of the three publications in proportion to its budget.

Sec. 4. That the surpluses and deficits that may occur be disposed of by those members on the auditing committee who come from the departments whose publication shows a surplus or deficit.

Art. 7. Sec. 1. That assistant managers of the various publications be chosen just as the managers are at present who shall represent their respective organization on the managerial board, and whose positions shall be purely honorary.

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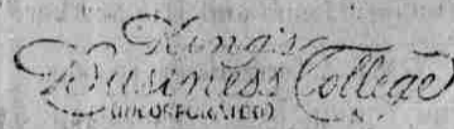
